We are making good progress with repairs and redecoration in the Kings Arms thanks to our small band of volunteers who have been working hard to get things ready for reopening. The next objective is to get staff in place, and we have been holding interviews. Because of the work still to be done and because we are all volunteers working as and when we are able it is still not possible to give an exact opening date, but we are optimistic that it will be in Early Summer.

Meanwhile, the new lease between the Trust which owns the building and the Ballantrae Community Pub Ltd which runs the Community Pub and Hub has been signed and is in place, and the Business Plan and Marketing Plan have been updated. ## Junior Road Safety Officers (JRSOs)

During term 3, our JRSO leaders, Katie and Connor, arranged road safety competitions for each class. Alexis was the winner in our $\mathrm{PI} / 2$ class and Erin in our P6/7 class. There was a high standard within our P3-5 class and the winners were Scott, Kody, Eric, Hannah and Collin.


## Heartstart

Heartstart came into school to give our P6 and P7 pupils a free, one hour, Emergency Life Support training session. Training included:

- How to help an unconscious casualty who is breathing - recovery position.
- How to help unconscious casualty who is not breathing - CPR.
- How to use a public access defibrillator.
- How to help someone suffering a heart attack.
- How to help someone choking.

Thank you to Heartstart for providing essential life-saving skills to our pupils.


## World of Work

Before Easter our children had visits from different people from the "World of Work". These activities are used to relate the World of Work to learning opportunities in school.

We would like to thank all of our speakers for giving up their time to share their experiences with our children. Bob Agnew brought in machinery and shared his role at McCulloch Rail; PC Johnston (Campus Cop at Girvan Academy) shared his role as a Community Police Officer; Chloe White shared her role as Dental Nurse/RNLI Volunteer; Gemma Laverty spoke to the children about her role as a Community Nurse and Marion McMillan delivered a presentation on her life as a vet.

## Farming Focus

For anyone walking around the village during February, you will have heard the bleating of new-born lambs calling out to their mothers from Kings Arms Farm. These lambs then gradually appeared in the fields surrounding the houses, once they were strong enough and the weather was favourable. The lambs grow on a daily basis and becoming quite large. They are a delight to watch with their 'playground antics', running around and having fun. For farmers who don't lamb so early, they started lambing outside from April. This depends more on drier weather conditions as the lambs have little protection against cold, wet weather - you would have seen them tucking up into their mothers' wool.

This spring has been wet and cold, which results in later grass growth, so many animals outside need to be fed extra by the farmers. It also meant that the local dairy herd at Laggan Farm wasn't out in the fields until the end of March. Unfortunately, you won't be seeing them in their usual field beside the river (just across the bridge) as this field had to be resown with grass seed and barley. Once grown, the barley will be chopped up and lifted for animal feed, leaving the young grass shoots underneath to continue growing and allowing the cows to come back into the area to feed.

From mid-April, the weather warmed up slightly and we had a dry spell. This enabled the beef farmers to start getting some of their cows and calves out of the sheds and onto grass fields. You can imagine the amount of dirt there is to clean up in the sheds after a long winter!

Hopefully the grass will grow and then we will start to forage it and bring it in as silage to the farmyard. As this magazine goes out, silage time will be underway with tractors busy carrying loads of freshly chopped up grass. This goes into large silage pits and covered with plastic to make it ferment - this will be the sum of the next winter feed.
