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The Cover picture shows the Stinchar Valley with Breaker Hill to the right. Insets show the diverse flora on the hill.





BALLANTRAE AND COLMONELL PRIMARY SCHOOLS



2 Pins Community Centre



The Centre will consist of a multi-purpose hall that will accommodate a 5 a-side pitch or 3 badminton courts which can also be used for functions and social and community events. A community café and small shop, 2 meeting rooms which can be opened up into 1 large room and into the large foyer which can be used to display art and local heritage. An arts and craft activity room for both adults and children. Outside is ample car parking and picnic areas. Other amenities being considered are electric car charging point, cash point, and telephone box.

All are invited to come along to monthly meetings the second Thursday in the month at 7.30 in Pinwherry Hall.

2 pins Up-Date

We are currently working on the final parts of our stage 2 Big Lottery Bid to Investing in Communities for 1 million pounds; we received a development grant which has enabled us to engage outside consultants to assist developing our bid. Those who have recently passed by the 2 Pins site will have noticed some drainage work being carried to relieve the flooding of the access road to the station cottages and the 2 pins site entrance. We have also purchased a steel container which we will now be able to store our marquees and equipment in. From the balance of the Lottery Awards for All grant, we have bought a second marquee, so we have 2 12mx6m marquees available for local community use.

Pinwherry Rail Halt

The company has a Grant from South Ayrshire Council Community Development fund to carry out a survey of residents in Pinwherry and Colmonell on who would use the rail Halt in Pinwherry. A letter and questionnaire is to be sent out in the next few weeks to all residents.

Pinwherry and Pinmore Community Development Pinwherry Primary School buildings

The Association are looking into the possibility of converting the now redundant school buildings into a Hostel and Bunk House. A meeting in the near future is planned to discuss the way forward to develop this idea.

BREAKER HILL WIND FARM PROPOSAL

Plans for nine 86 metre high wind turbines situated on Breaker Hill and Craig Hill, near Poundland between Pinwherry and Colmonell have been stopped after the Reporter appointed by the Scottish Government dismissed an appeal by the developer, Wind Prospect Developments Limited.

The Reporter refused the appeal on the grounds that the scheme would have significant adverse visual effects, including cumulative effects of other established wind farms, on key views to and from the Stinchar and Lower Duisk Valley area and Coastal Foothills.

The plans for a wind farm at Breaker Hill started in 2005 and South Ayrshire Council Planning Panel have refused two separate applications for a wind farm at this site. The second decision was reached on 19th June 2014 and Wind Prospect Developments then appealed to the Scottish Government.

Having visited the area and studied all the written submissions the Scottish Government Reporter dismissed the appeal.

Pinwherry Bridge CCTV

Residents in Pinwherry can help reduce costs for South Ayrshire Council and council tax payers by reporting any damage to Pinwherry Bridge. If damage is reported as soon as it happens, South Ayrshire Council can retrieve the CCTV footage and claim from the insurance of the driver who has done the damage.

BARRHILL MEMORIAL HALL UPDATE

The end of 2014 saw a very busy time for the Memorial Hall, with a coffee morning held with proceeds to Erskine Hospital and a very successful dance in November. December flew by with the Children's Christmas Party, the Pensioners' Christmas Dinner and the Whist Drive. 2015 is set to become a very important year for the Hall with exciting plans for development and refurbishment to be set in motion in order to allow the Hall to become fit for purpose to serve the residents of Barrhill.

The Hall's historical importance, both as a War Memorial and as an example of Arts and Crafts Design by a prominent architect, highlights the need to preserve what is an iconic building for the village. Additionally, the important social value of the Hall, for today and the future, is to "perform useful purpose" for the community of Barrhill, and this is no different to when it was first built. The demands placed on the Hall have, however, changed over the last ninety years and the layout of the building no longer allows it to fully perform the useful purposes that the community needs. It does not easily accommodate different users at the same time; there is no storage for user groups; the kitchen is too small and, together with toilet facilities, is in need of upgrading to meet modern demands.

The Memorial Hall is placed to become the beating heart of the community, a refurbished building will enable the Hall Management Committee to ensure that the hall becomes a centre to not only bring together the community, but also to increase tourism to Barrhill, which will in turn aid many local businesses and may help to attract new families to the area. An improved hall layout will enable multiple groups to use the hall simultaneously, a feat which is impossible under the current layout. New groups focusing on children, youth, young adults and pensioners will be established within the hall to support education, health and wellbeing. Also a refurbished hall will make the venue more attractive to host events and meetings and could eventually bring an income to the Village to provide more events for the residents of the Village, in addition to the Pensioners' Christmas Dinner and the Children's Halloween and Christmas Parties.

Funding applications and events are now being carefully planned for the coming year and 2016 to ensure that this refurbishment becomes a reality. The Hall at Barrhill was built as a memorial to the men from this district that lost their lives in the First World War and we had a small display of photographs and information on some of the people who were lost as well as the history of the Hall. The excellent sum of £327.00 was raised.

Barrhill Bowling Club has now closed for the season and our presentation Dinner was held in the Trout Inn. An excellent meal and night was had by all. Club re-opens on first Saturday in May.



CARRICK FUTURES OPEN FOR BUSINESS



Carrick Futures, which receives funds from Scottish Power Renewables' Mark Hill and Arecleoch wind farms, is open again for grant-making and keen to support a diverse range of community activity, particularly in the south Carrick area.

With a focus on the communities of Ballantrae, Colmonell & Lendalfoot, Barr, Barrhill, Pinmore & Pinwherry and Girvan & District, funds will support projects that make these communities even better places to live, work and visit. Some funds are also available for projects benefiting the wider Carrick area.

The Fund has been closed for new applications since the autumn so Directors could review its grant-making approach.

The Fund has three different grant levels. Small grants of up to £500 will continue to be administered by each of the primary community councils. Standard grants of £500 - £35,000 and large grants of over £35,000 will be administered through the secretariat, Foundation Scotland. Larger grants will now be subject to a two stage process. Directors will meet four times in 2015 to make decisions on awards.

Roger Pirrie, Carrick Futures Chair said: "It has been important for Directors to take stock of how we have been working up until now. This has involved talking with members of Carrick Futures and consulting with other stakeholders to review our application, assessment and reporting procedures. It is now time to open for business again and ensure that eligible groups are aware of the funding that Carrick Futures can provide. We are looking for strong projects that support regeneration and sustainability, especially when they also involve helping communities own or develop assets. We also recognise that much of the activity Carrick Futures is committed to supporting is done by volunteer-led groups and organisations and we are keen to support these groups to become stronger and even more effective."

STINCHAR VALLEY MAGAZINE - A CASE STUDY BY CARRICK FUTURES 2015

Stinchar Valley Magazine is a free, popular quarterly community magazine serving Ballantrae, Barr, Barrhill, Colmonell, Lendalfoot, Pinwherry and Pinmore in South Ayrshire.

It was born out of the Pinmore and Pinwherry Community Newsletter which kept residents informed about various events and news around the village, such as social occasions, travel notices and useful information about local business and services.

Nearby villages were inspired by the success of the newsletter and decided to work together to share one publication across all communities in the Stinchar Valley area.

It is a much valued community resource for residents of all ages and backgrounds, particularly for older people who don't get out and about as much as they might like to. It is also well received by local families, individuals and young people who want to know about upcoming events, job opportunities, local clubs and activities. Local businesses have the opportunity to showcase their products and services, and schools also use the magazine to share their success stories. The magazine also has the support of locally elected councillors who use it as a means to share regular updates and information with their constituents. Contributions are welcomed from all communities. Some form simple notices, announcements and news items. Others take shape in more feature-style articles – some editions have included fantastic

short stories and poems. This is perhaps one of the best features of the magazine, in that it doesn't follow a conventional style or format but rather is relaxed and adapts to suit the wants and needs of its readers.

The magazine and its production is entirely dependent on a committee of nine local residents and a core team of volunteers who solicit articles and compile content. Although once done in-house, printing is now outsourced due to increased circulation with around 1000 copies of each edition being produced.

Volunteers from each village also undertake to hand deliver copies of the magazine around their communities, which serves to show their commitment to the publication and its readers. Some additional copies are posted and a digital edition emailed to locals where it's simply not possible for them to be hand delivered. A copy is also put on local villages' websites, such as 2 Pins and Stinchar Valley.

Volunteers are keen to ensure the magazine is accessible and reaches as wide an audience as possible. Some copies are stocked in local shops, doctors' surgeries, care homes for the elderly, libraries and in Ballantrae Information Centre.

The magazine is an important part of community life in the Stinchar Valley. It fosters a great sense of team work amongst its contributors and volunteers who dedicate so much time and energy to ensure it is a success. It is also a much needed practical resource which keeps all members of the com-

munity up to date and involved in what's happening in their local area, regardless of their location or ability. In addition, it serves a very practical purpose, sharing useful information about what services and activities are available such as mother and toddler groups and various sports clubs and activities. It fosters a real sense of community spirit – sharing images and recording great memories of gala days and community events all year round.

In 2012 and 2013 Stinchar Valley Magazine received a grant from Carrick Futures (£6707 and £8391, respectively) towards the costs of printing and distributing the magazine.

John McAlley, Editor of Stinchar Valley magazine, said, "We at the Stinchar Valley Magazine are here to support our community, we have enjoyed the production and the development of the magazine and up to now have resisted suggestions to charge for our advertising space or for the magazine itself.

We are very aware that our continued existence depends not only on the continued support from the community we serve but very much from Carrick Futures and Hadyard Hill Community Benefit Funds, which have allowed us to grow and to include more colour and space into the magazine, without these funds, we would not be here!"

An Independent View

The year is now well under way and January Blues have been banished for another year. Having said that, some things always cause the Blues and none more so than Potholes!! I always assumed in my Community Council days that a local councillor's caseload would be dealing with various issues and concerns. However given the condition of the roads network, a great deal of that casework relates to road issues with potholes coming top of the pile. The one thing that I can assure readers of The Stinchar Valley Magazine is that as one of the South Ayrshire Councillors on The Ayrshire Roads Alliance shared services committee, I will endeavour to see that improvements in the roads repair process equates to a better journey for road users in South Ayrshire in the short to medium term. Changes are scheduled to be made to the process of repairs in the new financial year to make them more effective and to get away from just rolling a bit of tar in to potholes. One good thing to report is the fact that South Ayrshire Council has allocated an extra ten million pounds over the next five years to try and tackle some of the problems and make the network safer.

You may be aware that your three elected councillors share the responsibility of attending the different Community Councils in South Carrick and this year I will be in attendance at Ballantrae Community Council plus Colmonell and Lendalfoot Community Councils having been at Dailly and Barr last time round. I enjoy this part of my council work and it gives the chance to hear how things are from the community troops on the ground as well as the chance to help out with any issues that may arise. Each community has different concerns and aspirations but they also have many things in common. The reason that I say this is because it is clear to me that the links between all of the communities in Girvan and South Carrick are strong and interlinked. What is good for one community can benefit another, whether that is through tourism, infrastructure or social enterprise.

That's why I make it my job to make sure that I push the interests of Girvan and South Carrick in County Buildings at every possible opportunity.

Work started on the new Community Facilities building at Girvan Harbour on the 2nd of February, the construction being carried out by local firm 3b Construction. This marks the start of an exciting year for Girvan and South Carrick. This building will provide new shower and laundry facilities for harbour users as well as new 24 hour public toilets and a new Harbour Master's office. It marks the start of phase two of the Girvan Harbour Improvements and is also part of the Girvan economic re-generation project. The funding is now in place for the Girvan and South Carrick Leisure Centre which will be a major facility for the residents of Girvan and the villages as well as a major driver for tourism. The final tweaks to the design are taking place, a contractor has been named, planning will be applied for shortly and the build is due to start around October with a timescale of anything between 13 to 16 months.

Of course there are some events which will have a major impact on all of this year. The British General Election take place in May and this April will see the start of the Integration of Health and Social Care which should see services in this type of area based on local needs. It will however be a major change and will need some time to bed in. Well life is never boring!!! Here's looking forward to a Summer as good as last year.

THE NEW FARMER PROGRAMME

In the Winter edition of the magazine we told you about the New Farmer Programme being established to assist small food growing businesses who are looking for skilled staff; to help people to set up their own food business and sell direct to local customers; to help farmers keen to diversify and grow some food for the local market alongside their core business; and community gardens starting to produce food for the local community looking for skilled growers.

From March to December 2014 Nourish ran its first New Farmer Programme, a vocational training programme both for new entrants to the sector and for those wanting to develop their food growing, local marketing and small business skills. Currently, there is no training in Scotland for people who want to acquire the skills needed to run their own local food businesses or even to apply for a food growing job. Nourish's New Farmer Programme is designed to fill this gap.

Twenty people successfully completed the training, of whom nearly half are working in, or are now in the process of setting up their own local food business. Others are putting their skills to good use in the community growing sector, to encourage these projects to grow produce as well as community.

As well as providing skills, the participants all reported the course has been invaluable for putting them in touch with a hugely inspiring and supportive network, both of existing organic growers and local food businesses, and also like minded individuals at a similar stage looking for potential enterprise partners.

Now the organisers – Nourish Scotland - are building on what they have learnt and preparing to run the course again in 2016. Meanwhile, they are holding a number of training days, offering skills that will add to those people may already have, or as a taster to prepare for next year's programme. The first of these is on March 6th/7th 2015. For more information contact nfp@nourishscotland.org.uk.

BALLANTRAE CHURCH LINKED WITH ST COLMON CHURCH

Recently I read about the life of a former resident of the Manse in Ballantrae. While I doubt many of you would be able to tell me much about the person's life, you will have definitely heard about his very famous uncle. Between 1826 and 1930, Rev Thomas Burns was the minister of Ballantrae Parish Church and no prizes for guessing that his uncle was Robert Burns.

Thomas was the son of Gilbert, Robert's brother, and after studying in Edinburgh to become a minister, he was ordained as the minister of the parish of Ballantrae on 13th April 1826. In 1830, Thomas got married, and moved to Monkton Church, and was responsible for the building of St Cuthbert's Church. Then in 1843, Thomas came out of the Church of Scotland and was part of the group of ministers which formed the Free Church. He initially became the first minister of Prestwick Free Church, however Thomas didn't stay long and soon headed to New Zealand to become the minister of a Free Church settlement at Otago.


In fact the more you read about this extraordinary man, the more twists you find that his life took. No one can map out everything that we will do in our lives and we often take a route that can surprise even ourselves. I am sure you have heard people say, "if only you knew me ten years ago, you would never believe that I would be doing this now."

As I look back on my life I know that the different experiences that I have faced have been there for a reason. The writer of Proverbs 16:9 says "We make our own plans, but the Lord decides where we will go." And so we trust God that both the good and the difficult paths that we all walk in life, are there for a reason, though it may take years to find out what that is.

Just think about Thomas Burns. I wonder if he ever thought as he grew up on a farm, that the skills he learnt would one day be extremely useful when he was setting up a new life in New Zealand. Therefore each step and experience prepares us for what we will do in the future.

Hello to all readers of the Stinchar Valley Magazine,

As I write this contribution to the magazine, the snow drops and crocuses are pushing through and the daylight hours are stretching, something I always appreciate after the depths of winter. It has been a mixed winter weather wise, with rain, snow and ice which of course, has contributed to the problems with potholes, drainage and poor road repairs. Myself, and I am sure my fellow Councillors in Girvan and South Carrick, are well aware of the need for investment on the A714 and other roads in the area. I am pleased to report that £10 million is to be allocated over the next five years for road improvements throughout the Ayrshire Roads Alliance area. I also understand that three stretches of the A714 have major improvements planned in the new financial year. Recently a detailed survey was undertaken by an external company which has itemised many improvements for the A714. I understand and share the frustration among drivers when they see poor repairs to pot holes which do not last more than a few weeks. I have reported many areas of concern from Pinwherry and Pinmore Community Council, Barrhill Community Council and other concerned residents to the Head of the Roads Section and I and many others trust the promised improvements take place in the near future.

Holocaust Memorial Day

On the 27th of January I was privileged to attend the National Holocaust Memorial Day event in Ayr Town Hall. This was sponsored by the Provost of South Ayrshire Council, Helen Moonie and attended by the First Minister Nicola Sturgeon. It was a very moving occasion and was a living testament of the horrors of genocide as told by Lily Ebert who as a child survived a concentration camp in Czechoslovakia

and by Hasan Hasanovic who survived the genocide in Srebrenica in 1995 but whom sadly lost his father and two brothers amongst the 15,000 who perished. The evening provided a stark reminder of the demons of Intolerance and how we must "Keep the memory alive" of those who suffered in the 2nd World War, in Bosnia, Cambodia and more recently Darfur, Sudan.

Scotland's Great Tapestry coming to Ayr

The Great Tapestry of Scotland is one of the most ambitious community arts projects in the world, which has brought hundreds of volunteer embroiderers together from across Scotland to create a record-breaking 143 metre long embroidered tapestry. This tapestry illustrates the history of Scotland in 160 intricate panels. It is also the world's longest embroidered tapestry and is 70m longer than the famous Bayeux Tapestry in Normandy. The good news is that it's coming to Ayr from Good Friday (3rd April for two months) and not only will people get the chance to see it up close, a series of workshops, community engagement activities and history sessions will be organised to fit in with the exhibition.




Games were played and the committee sang Christmas Carols accompanied by Lynne McIlwraith.

Games were played and a lovely tea served.



GALLOWAY AND SOUTHERN AYRSHIRE BIOSPHERE



Take a closer look at the Galloway and Southern Ayrshire Biosphere

Carrick is part of Scotland's first Biosphere Reserve, simply known as a Biosphere, awarded in recognition of its special environments which are valued by local people. It has an amazing combination of

countryside, wildlife and culture so it is easy to see why people care about their surroundings and want you to take a closer look.

The rugged coastline is studded with impressive castles and hidden caves with many secrets to reveal from gory tales to fascinating geology. The Ayrshire Coastal Path was developed and is now managed by volunteers to make this stunning area much more accessible. Wherever you go along the Carrick coast you don't have to walk far before you find a stunning view but if you take a look down may be surprised by the beauty of the plants at your feet.

Where the land meets the sea is always a demanding place for plants to survive because they have to cope with a combination of wind, salt water and a lack of soil. A summer carpet of yellow, pink and blue flowers adorns different types of seashore from sand dunes to rocky cliffs. These plants have adapted to flourish by the sea and some are so scarce that they are protected so remember a wild flower always looks better in the ground than in your hand.

Flowering plants attract many sorts of insects; the most attractive being butterflies and day flying moths. The rare Northern Brown Argus is a butterfly that lays its egg on the upper surface of the leaves of the yellow flowering rock-rose. Like its name suggests, it is a chocolate brown colour on top but has a pretty spotted underside and is often seen basking in the sun, hiding away in long grasses when it becomes breezy.

Of course wetlands are more than just havens for wildlife. They also provide valuable resources for education, recreation, energy production and agriculture in the newly designated Galloway and Southern Ayrshire Biosphere.

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TYPES OF CROSSWORDS and the 'Solution'

When people hear the term *crossword*, what generally comes to mind is a square-shaped ground divided into smaller squares, arranged vertically and horizontally, that stand for letters, with the first of each word being numbered. The clues to each word are given with the puzzle. There are a number of variations on this theme featured on Puzzle Choice, listed above, and include:

- **alpha-cross:** The first letter of each word is written next to the clue that pertains to it, in alphabetical order, and one is already placed on the grid.
- **arrows:** Each square with a clue is colored, and an accompanying arrow indicates whether the answer goes across or down.
- **code words:** A random number from 1 to 26 is used to represent each letter of the alphabet, and each letter is used at least once. A certain number of letters may already be in place.
- **criss-cross:** Each answer intersects with one and only one other answer, and one, if any, box per word is highlighted; together the highlighted letters form another word.
- **cross-wise:** No numbers are given, so the player must use his or her powers of deduction to solve the clues, which describe words with a given number of letters in either orientation, e. g. "One of the two horizontal seven-letter words is part of a bird's wing and the other is stomach."
- **diagramless:** The diagram is not given. Instead, the row and column at which the first clue begins are indicated.
- **search words:** This is really different from a crossword puzzle because the words are already there, but they are surrounded by other letters that are not a part of them and the player has to locate them.
- **grid jigs:** These start with a blank grid and a set of sub-grids, each with some letters and blank spaces on it. The object of this type of game is to put the pieces back together by filling in all the letters and blank spaces in their correct spaces in the grid.



The puzzle does not always take the form of a square grid. It may take on any number of other shapes, including an octagon with the sides resembling staircases, a diamond shape or a triangle.

In some crossword puzzles, all the words belong to a particular category. For example, there are crosswords devoted to capital cities, poetry, fruits and vegetables, geographical names, astronomical names, historical personages and animals.

There is even a set of puzzles called true or false. In these, two clues are given for each word, one of them true and the other one false, and the player has to choose the true one and put it in its proper place. As an example, one such clue is "unmarried man/unmarried woman" for 3 across. The fact that there are eight letters in that position indicates that the correct choice is the first, which is "bachelor."
