The Ballantrae Trust Update

I hope that everyone has been keeping well and coping during lockdown. Although the Trust hasn't been able to do many of the things we've wanted to do, an enormous amount of work has been taking place behind the scenes.

As reported in the last Ballantrae News, we had secured funding to take the next step to purchasing the Kings Arms Hotel for the community. Since the last news, we have made an offer, which Brian and Suzanne accepted (see below).

“The Ballantrae Trust is delighted to announce that Brian and Suzanne Stirling have agreed to sell the Kings Arms to the Trust. Due to the current economic climate, the total amount the Trust was able to raise was less than we had hoped, but Brian, Suzanne, and the family, wanted The Kings Arms “to remain a pub for the village”, and they have accepted what we were eventually able to offer, so we want to thank them for helping us to make this happen.”

At the time of writing this, we are hoping that the purchase will be finalised within the next week.



Next Steps...

We hope to be open for the groups who use the pub regularly, so although the hours will be reduced, we will try to accommodate everyone who has been missing their get togethers, but all done with social distancing of course! Opening times, to be advised, we will try to get them on the notice boards and online. However, please note that due to Covid facilities will be limited for the time

being, and initially the kitchen will be shut. We hope to start recruiting for a manager/management couple who will work towards

getting the pub fully functioning again, including meals.

We also want your thoughts and ideas about what you think the Kings Arms should look like. We are going to be circulating a questionnaire to get your opinions. Don't hold back, tell us what you think, even if you think the idea is totally 'out there', we still want to hear it.

As a Community Pub, it was always intended

that everyone in the village should be able to have a stake in the pub and it's use. With this in mind, we have applied to the Financial Services Authority to create a BenCom. This is a Community Benefit share scheme, in which everyone can invest in the revitalisation of the Kings Arms. This allows each shareholder (no matter how much or little you invest) an equal say in how the Kings Arms is run, as well as providing funds for its future development. Please look out for the Prospectus which will be available online, leaflets that will be available locally and, in the Kings Arms, itself.

The Trust is always looking for members to join and/or become a Board Member as will the BenCom, so, if you are interested, please let me know. You can give me a call or drop me a message through Facebook or our website and we can have a chat. Alternatively, you can speak to any of the other Board members who will be more than happy to chat with you about joining. I am delighted to say that in the last few weeks, we have been offered support from so many people in the community which gives us great hope for how we see the pub being the hub of the community of Ballantrae. Thank you to everyone who has supported this, without you we couldn't have made it this far.

Ballantrae Medical Practice Update

We are still trying to minimise the footfall in the surgery so can we please ask that where possible all appointments / enquiries and repeat prescription requests are made by telephone.

We also now kindly request that face coverings are worn when coming to the surgery, either for an appointment or to collect a prescription. Social distancing and hand hygiene rules remain in place. **Please also note that for repeat medication please allow 48 hours from the time of ordering until collection.**

Flu Clinics

We are in the process of finalising the dates for this year's flu clinics. Once the dates are confirmed, all those eligible for this vaccine will receive an invitation letter asking them to telephone the surgery to make an appointment. Please note that you must bring your invitation letter with you when attending your appointment.

Resumption of services

The following services have now resumed:

- Outpatient appointments (these may be done via telephone / video call)
- Some endoscopy services including colonoscopy
- Cervical Screening (non-routine only)
- Breast Screening (priority to those invited prior to the pause in services)

There are new procedures in place when attending out-patient clinics but you will be advised of these prior to any appointment.







Ballantrae Geology and Poetry

Stuart Graham received a “Highly Commended Poetry Award” in the Hugh Miller Writing Competition. In this extract from an article he wrote for Scottish Natural Heritage (now Nature Scot) he talked about geology and the rock formations around Ballantrae.

“In these uncertain times we often look for havens that promise long-term stability. Our wilder landscapes, for example, can seem permanent and resistant to change.

Working from home during lockdown, I have

taken comfort in my view of our local hill Criffel, made from reassuringly strong granite. It was named by the Vikings and, while the native woodland clothing its sides has vanished, has not changed noticeably in shape or form since mankind first set foot in Scotland.

With just a little knowledge and imagination however, our seemingly static landscapes can erupt into life and personally I see many Scottish landscapes as wildly dynamic. In South Ayrshire at Ballantrae, you can see the muds that lay on the ocean floor between Scotland and England now stacked like a deck of cards and crumpled into mountains as the ocean crust was pushed up onto the earth’s surface.

For me however, it is the deep time of Lewisian Gneiss that signifies true stability. A quarter the age of the earth, it has rested deep in the crust with only an occasional episode disturbing it from its long sleep.

When I saw the Hugh Miller Writing Competition call for submissions on a geological theme earlier this year I saw an opportunity to combine two of my interests to celebrate the legacy of Hugh Miller – Cromarty’s pioneering geologist and poet of the early 19th century – and raise the profile of Scotland’s outstanding geology and landscapes through poetry.” Here is one of Stuart’s three submissions entitled “Ballantrae”.


Ballantrae

Where catch is Sawney’s brand
Or contraband on this, the
Coast of the hidden secrets.*

*Secrets that should be buried deep
Yet we cannot see the wood for the trees
Where ocean floor crests the hill

*And pillow lavas bulge with excitement
As serpentinite slithers inland
With jasper red eyes
To nestle with the trilobites.*

As part of the Biosphere’s PLACE in the Stinchar Valley project, the Ballantrae Trust and the Community Council have been working with the Biosphere and the other communities in the Stinchar Valley to explore the rich geological history of the area. Ballantrae Coastguard

With the easing of lockdown we saw an increase in 999 calls made to the Coastguard. Working with other Search and Rescue units, Police, Fire and Ambulance we have attended calls for help ranging from missing persons, inflatables drifting out to sea and ordnance washed up on the beach.

This year has been a busy year for the volunteers of Ballantrae Coastguard with 34 callouts to date made up of 4 ordnance, 10 missing persons, 3 vessels in distress, 3 suspicious objects on or near the water, 10 water rescues and 4 persons in distress.

This year has also seen the launch of What3words which has been a great help for the emergency services. It is a free app for your phone that breaks the UK into 3 metre squares that are identified by 3 unique words. When calling 999, giving these 3 words helps emergency services find your location quickly and easily.

In a coastal emergency call 999 and ask for the Coastguard.

- Travel**: Issues obtaining refunds/cancellations and booking scams
- HMRC Messages**: Fake Government emails/texts offering grants or tax refunds
- Events**: Issues obtaining refunds/cancellations for bookings
- Fake Websites**: Selling products which are never delivered
- Business Grants**: Fake Government emails offering business grants
- Contact Tracing**: Scammers posing as contact tracers to obtain consumer's details
- Price Gouging**: Retailers inflating prices of in-demand products
- Fake PPE**: Counterfeit face masks and PPE which doesn't offer the advertised protection
- Doorstep Scams**: Cold callers offering overpriced or unnecessary services
